**President's Report**

The past year has been very busy, not least because of all the planning for the Pentangular which takes place next weekend. Three years' planning over in three days! But at its heart is acquaintance and fellowship which, along with service, are the key tenets of being a Rotarian.

At last year's Club Assembly, I underlined the priorities for my Presidential Year:

- Fellowship & Fun - with every member having a role
- Improve Communication both amongst members and the outside world
- Bring in new members
- Reinvigorate Fund Raising
- Reinforce our place in our community whether at home or abroad.
  - Support for the homeless and young people
- To try and simplify our Rotary?

It goes without saying, of course, that support for our ongoing fundraising projects and charitable activities was also a key objective.

On the fellowship front we enjoyed the black tie musical picnic at Charlton Park last August – weather notwithstanding - and we then had an extremely well-attended Christmas Dinner in December. We tried something different with the Valentines Musical evening – which would have benefitted from better acoustics. Still to come we have the Pentangular, the Falklands Dinner and the annual Safari Supper. I have enjoyed mixing the traditional with the ambitious; I hope other members have enjoyed it as well.

In a club the size of ours communication will always be a challenge. We live in the real world where it's not possible for all members to attend all meetings and we have to accept that at any one time perhaps no more than two-thirds are present at any one time. Modern technology allows for almost instant communication and that is what I have attempted to do with the 'President's Puffs' newsletters. Preparing them, though, takes time, but I have tried to make them a priority.

Communicating with the outside world is less easy. As a club we must become more adept at exploiting social media. Club Council has backed redesigning the website to make it more accessible and friendly.

On the need to bring in more members, I think, over the past Rotary Year, we have been rather successful. It has given me the greatest pleasure to induct five new members: Jo Nolan; Julie Reza; Graham Bough; David Bailey; Neil Fraser. I doubt there is another President in District 1120 that has inducted so many new members. However, I'm not just pleased because of the number; I'm also pleased at the new dimension they all bring to the club – and that all of them are younger than me! They all, too, either are, or have recent experience of the work-place which is so important for a club like ours. We have other prospective members in the pipeline so hopefully it won't be long before we hit the 'magic' 70.

Sadly we bade farewell to three former members during the year: Vic Banks, Ted Abbott and John Collard.

So, unlike some clubs, membership at the moment isn't an issue for our club – we're the biggest in District 1120. But maintaining momentum to run our various fund-raising projects is.

We organised another successful Duck Race last September, there was the street collection for the Haiti floods and Peter Hermitage master-minded an incredibly successful maiden Boxing Night in January. We ran a profitable bucket collection in memory of Hannah Loughran in February and there was Top Choir Kent in April. However, with TCK, there is a sense of weariness amongst the organising team and it's clear we need a new approach or fresh ideas. That, though, is an answer which will hopefully emanate from the newly formed Fund Raising Committee under Stephen Thompson.

As part of my wish to reinvigorate fundraising, I have been encouraging committee chairmen since last July to prepare a budget for any projected spending so as to give the fund raising committee a target at which to aim. I think we're getting there on that one!

We have had problems with the web-based Event Management System, but new support arrangements with our contractor, ExtraDigital, will hopefully mean any problems are fixed quickly and efficiently.

I have been pleased to represent the club at a number of initiatives for young people organised by the Vocational Service Committee including the Innovation Competition, Schools' Writing Competition and Public Speaking. The Millennium Scholarship Trust Fund has disbursed funds to a number of qualifying young people and it's a privilege, being a trustee, to sit on the panel interviewing prospective recipients.

The Pentangular Project, JPP3, to provide educational bursaries in Juba, South Sudan, starts soon. Rotary doing extraordinary things in difficult situations.

Pentangular has been a major focus of mine over the past few years. It's taking a lot of planning and the coming weekend will prove its success or otherwise.

The President's Charity is progressing well and I'm confident I will be able to hand over a very reasonable cheque to Porchlight for their young people's project before the end of my year in office.

Have I managed to simplify our Rotary? We are a big club, there is always lots going on but I still believe we should spend less time debating minutiae and more time actually doing. I failed to find the magic bullet, so perhaps, on that one, not quite so successful.

We could also have handled our election process for new officers better at the Extraordinary General Meeting last December. There will be an opportunity to remedy that at the EGM this coming December.

Finally, I wish to express my thanks for the extraordinary amount of support I have received this year. Planning Pentangular has shown several members at their absolute best. Not for them asking questions about the amount of work involved, or saying how much they're doing already, just a willingness to take it on and get it sorted.

I also want to say a very personal thank-you for the understanding and support following the death of my dear old mother last September. Although she was very poorly, the speed of her final decline surprised us all. It was a tough few weeks and, at times, difficult to hold it all together. But I knew I could rely on President-Elect Sharon when I needed to take time out - and it provided good practice for next year!

It has been a privilege and a pleasure to lead your club over the past 11 months – and we still have one more month to go!

### **REPORT TO AGM 2017**

In the last 12 months a total of £6,670 in donations have been approved by the Community Service Committee

## **AGM 2017 - Vocational Services Report for the year to 30<sup>th</sup> June 2017**

### **Schools and young people.**

Vocational Services has concentrated much of its effort reaching out to schools and young people in the Canterbury area.

- Youth Speaks was successful with Simon Langton Girls School representing us in the District final. We hope to get more entries this coming year.
- Children's' writing competition at Christmas time produced over 60 entries from five schools covering the primary school years one to six. However as the schools were invited to only submit their top three in each year, we do know that many more children took part. Presentation of the prizes by the President at four school assemblies was a great success.
- Innovation competition. The fourth year of this has proved very successful thanks to the sterling efforts of Brian Dobinson. Judging is in June with over 100 entries.
- We have also supported the English Speaking Union Schools Public Speaking Competition at the Guildhall and are talking with the ESU on the possibility of greater links with our own Youth Speaks competition.
- We also provided some small liaison with the Big Sing.

There were some disappointments including that we failed to enthuse the fellow members of our cluster group to join with us in children's competitions.

### **Outings and Events**

Trips were arranged to Fordwich, Chapel Down and Small Hythe, and Richborough all of which were successful and enjoyed by the participants, and in June Brian is organising a visit to Bayham Abbey and Battle with the theme of Monasticism. A bird watching expedition to Conyer Creek organised by Alan Forrest and John Hill was also much enjoyed although the birds decided not to appear that morning.

### **Next Year**

Next year we hope to continue with all of our competitions and to organise more informative events. Planning is in hand for trips to Dover Museum and an artist's studio amongst others. We are also looking at a scheme for mentoring Young People in our local Job Centre which is being rolled out across the District. For this to be viable we will need volunteers from across the club.

## AGM 16 May 2017 Millennium Scholarship Trust Fund Report

The Millennium Scholarship Fund (MSTF) has received requests for sponsorship and grants from 13 young people in the current Rotary Year, in the age range 16 to 25 years, seeking support to undertake charitable voluntary work overseas.

Two of the applications did not meet the MSTF criteria for the project to be organized through a charity or for the volunteer to have a suitable connection with the Canterbury area. One of these applicants was referred to her local Rotary Clubs as a possible source of support.

11 application forms for a MSTF grant have been sent out to applicants.

Three awards have been made to applicants totalling £1650 for projects which will all be completed by September 2017 so the Club will be able to hear from the volunteers in the Autumn of 2017 with an account of their experiences.

Of the remaining eight applicants one was intending to undertake voluntary work in 2018 and was invited to resubmit an application when his plans were formulated. Two of the applicants completed the fund raising required for their projects without needing a grant from MSTF and so the applications were withdrawn.

The remaining five applicants have not submitted an application form despite follow up reminders and so the requests for support are on hold. However, it seems that at least two of the requests are unlikely to proceed given how much time has now elapsed.

The Treasurer's AGM report will set out the current financial position of the Fund.

The means of engaging with young people who could benefit from MSTF is changing. Letters with information about MSTF and with A4 information posters were sent to 11 secondary schools and colleges in the Canterbury area. However, eight of the initial contacts were general website contacts with enquiries for funding or support. Three of the initial enquiries were sent to the MSTF email address. One of the applicants was referred to R C Canterbury by a member of the R C Norwich.

It does seem that the future lies in promoting MSTF on the Club website and through social media.

In turn, many of the young people organize their fund raising through the Just Giving website and the use of social media to promote their other fund raising activities

The type of project that young people undertake may also be changing. There has been a lack of applicants intending to take a 'gap year' between school and university and intending to use the time to undertake a period of volunteering with a charity overseas – although the applicant who was invited to reapply next year may be such a candidate.

The projects seen this year are shorter and more focussed ranging from approximately one month to approximately three months. Two of the awards this year have been made to school students undertaking a project in Cambodia organised by their schools with the 'Camps International' charity.

A number of the applicants this year were students intending to volunteer through schemes organized by the International Citizen Service (a government funded organization) with eight partner charities which includes a three-month project abroad, but also requires the young person to complete **"Action at Home"** by applying what they have learned overseas to tackle an issue of their own choosing on their return to UK.

In conclusion, young people are still motivated to volunteer to make a change for the better where they can, we just need to be able to connect with them and to enable them to find us.
