INTERNATIONAL COMMITTEE

MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD ON TUESDAY 9TH APRIL 2019

In attendance: Viv Pritchard (Chairman), Margaret Griffin, Caroline Lees, Dee Mepstead, Rosemary Doyle, Julie Reza, Michael Leadbeater.

- 1. Apologies received from Kailash Maunick, Jenny Brown. Graham Bough, Jan Bobba, Robin Vickers, Gill Dixon, Leonard Rea.
- 2. Minutes of last meeting 12th March 2019 agreed

3. Matters arising

- a. RC Dhaka JR has investigated charities in Bangladesh and has been in touch with RC Dhaka, who we have previously supported. They currently have a project to provide girls with hygiene kit bags. Although they hope to be able to get these to the Rohingya refugee camps, there can be no guarantee as the camps are under the control of the UN. The committee agree to make a donation of £300.
- b. DESO VP confirmed that a donation of £300 has been sent to DESO and he has received a letter of thanks.
- c. Healthcare Ethiopia Partnership VP explained his contact with HEP. They have very recently sent out a team of midwives and sought assistance to purchase refrigeration units to store medication essential for new mothers. Members of the committee agreed to fund three units for three health centres at a total cost of £486. VP has sent the donation of £486 to HEP accordingly.

4. Shelterbox – Cyclone Idai

- **a.** Confirmed that members of the committee agreed, by email, to emergency donation to Shelterbox for the Cyclone Idai relief effort, to be funded from the International Service Committee. **The treasurer has sent the donation of £590.**
- b. In addition, two street collections were organised at short notice. There was good support from members of the club and we were helped by volunteers from RC Canterbury Sunrise and the Inner Wheel. A total of about £720 was collection and three very generous donations were received. With gift aid, it is anticipated that there will be close to sufficient funds for a further three shelterboxes. VP to contact the treasurer to arrange further payment for three boxes. Members agreed that the committee will fund any shortfall.

5. Juba Bursary Project

a. Update – MG updated the committee on her recent visit. There were very positive developments. MG had met representatives of the UK government and US agencies, who were impressed by the success achieved by the school. She had also met the new leaders of the RC Juba, who are determined to take on a positive role in future. Dick Beath visited the school at the same time and undertook a financial investigation to ensure good management and probity in relation to the bursary project. He has submitted his report and has confirmed that he was able to account for all the money donated to date.

- b. Budget VP has produced a summary of the current financial situation see end of minutes. Funding is already secured for Year 3 and the budget projections for Year 4 appear to be manageable.
- 6. Lend with Care The current account with LwC totals £1500. Kailash is currently increasing this to £2,000. A further seven loans of £30 each was made last month, and 41 small repayments of past loans were paid. The current balance available to make new loans is £375.

To date – 82 loans have been made. 448 entrepreneurs have been supported, 1590 family member helped, and 313 jobs created.

- 7. Budget Before the meeting, the funding available to the committee was about £2,000.
- 8. Ideas for new donations
 - a. Songsten VP had spoken to Richard K-C who provided details of a charity supporting abandoned children in Nepal through a trustee based locally. The children were being cared for by Buddhist monks. Robin V has checked out the website and the charity commission and commented that the organisation has underspent its income over the past 3 years and did not appear to be short of funds. There was some concern by members of the strong emphasis on religion/ philosophy by the organisation. It was decided to defer consideration of a donation at this stage.
 - b. New Life Nyambene John Hill had spoken to VP about this small organisation which provides shelter, food and education for street children in Kenya. John H knows a local lady who is closely involved. Robin V has checked out the organisation and confirmed that they have very limited funds, so any donation would make a real difference. **The committee agreed to offer a donation of £500 to New Life Nyambene**.
 - c. Water Aid VP tried to make contact through a friend, but the friend's daughter no longer works for them. VP will make further enquiries to explore whether we could support a specific project.
 - d. Environmental CL has undertaken some investigation but most environmental charities appear to be large international organisations. She will investigate Hadlow College and Seeds for Africa and report to the next meeting.
 - e. Save the Children the committee remains keen to support refugees from Syria and the Yemen. VP to pursue matter with Cora Kemball-Cook who helps with fundraising for the local branch of Save the Children.
